YOU MAY ASK—

WHY SHOULD I CONTRIBUTE TO THE OLYMPIC FUND?

The answer is:

1. Because you are an American and a citizen of the largest nation in the world, whose athletes have established a brilliant record of success in former Olympic games and thereby brought honor and respect to this Nation and to you as one of its citizens.
2. Because in all Olympic games, the United States team has to depend upon voluntary contributions from its citizens. While the Olympic teams of most nations are financed by their respective governments, the U. S. Government has never made any contribution to this cause.
3. Because the Olympic games are the greatest stimulus to amateur sport and as a result there are today millions of youngsters in this country interested in the Olympic games and looking forward to the time when they, too, may become participants.

What does this interest mean to the nation as a whole?

First—There is developed in all these young men and women the love of competition. Competition is the mainspring of our American system.

Second—The health of the nation is a matter of primary importance. Participation in athletics means healthy bodies and healthy minds.

Third—This country is paying an enormous toll to crime. Most criminals are young people. We pay for their criminal activities in the cost of courts, reformatories, jails and penitentiaries, and also more seriously through loss in life, thefts and property damage totaling many millions of dollars annually. The substitution of the adventure of sport for the adventure of crime through the development of interest in athletics among our young people is the most effective kind of insurance.

As you read in the daily papers the history of lawbreakers, you don't find that any of them were ever active in athletics. If they had been, they would not be lawbreakers and criminals.

There will be 53 nations competing in the Olympic games to be held in Berlin during the first two weeks of August. The number of representatives from the United States will depend upon our ability to raise the necessary funds to provide for their transportation, equipment, board, lodging, uniforms, medical service and all other incidentals in connection with their competition in the Olympic games.

The situation this year is more difficult than ever before, because of the feeling on the part of some that United States participation in the games means approval and endorsement of the government where the games are held. This is not the case in any degree.

Conditions this year compel EVERY SPORT to finance its own representatives. This is particularly difficult with rowing because it has no gate.

It will be only a few weeks now when we will see headlines in large type across the top of the newspapers reporting each day's competition in the Olympic games. When we read of a victory by a United States athlete, team or crew, we will feel a natural pride in their prowess and ability against the champions of all other nations of the world.

If YOU will make a nominal contribution to the cause, YOU can feel that YOU are having a personal part in making the victories possible.

Rules and Instructions To Rowing Contestants

1. The Regatta is governed by the rules of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen.

2. All races are over a distance of 2000 metres (13 yards less than $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles) except the $\frac{1}{4}$ mile Races for Single Sculls.

3. Any entry not at the starting line at the time scheduled in the program is liable to disqualification.

4. Every contestant must wear a shirt with a number on the back, indicating his position in the race. The numbers will be given to all contestants a sufficient time before the races.

5. Every contestant MUST go through the particular arch of the trolley bridge which is indicated by his position in the race. Any contestants failing to do this will be disqualified. Numbers designating the respective positions are suspended from the arches of the bridge.

6. All positions are numbered from the west shore.

7. If in the judgment of the Referee it should be necessary to stop any race, it will be done by firing a gun several times in succession from the Referee's boat. Immediately upon notice, all contestants should cease rowing.

All contestants in 145-lb. Classes must report to and be weighed-in on the evening before their race by the Clerks of Scales, who will be at the Boat House of the Penn Athletic Club Rowing Association, Boat House Row, Fairmount Park, between the hours of 6 and 7 P. M.

If within THIRTY SECONDS of the start of any race, one of the contestants meets with an accident in the nature of broken equipment such as a broken oar, broken rigger, row lock, slide or foot rest, he may appeal to the Referee by holding up his hand and request that the race be recalled. After thirty seconds from the start, no appeal for any recall will be considered. Any accident

after that is the contestant's own responsibility.

Under no circumstances must any contestant ask for a recall because of a jumped slide, the catching of a crab, or losing hold of an oar. All such misfortunes are at the contestant's own risk.

NOTE: Prizes will be awarded to winners at the Penn Athletic Club on Saturday evening, July 4th, after the conclusion of the Regatta.

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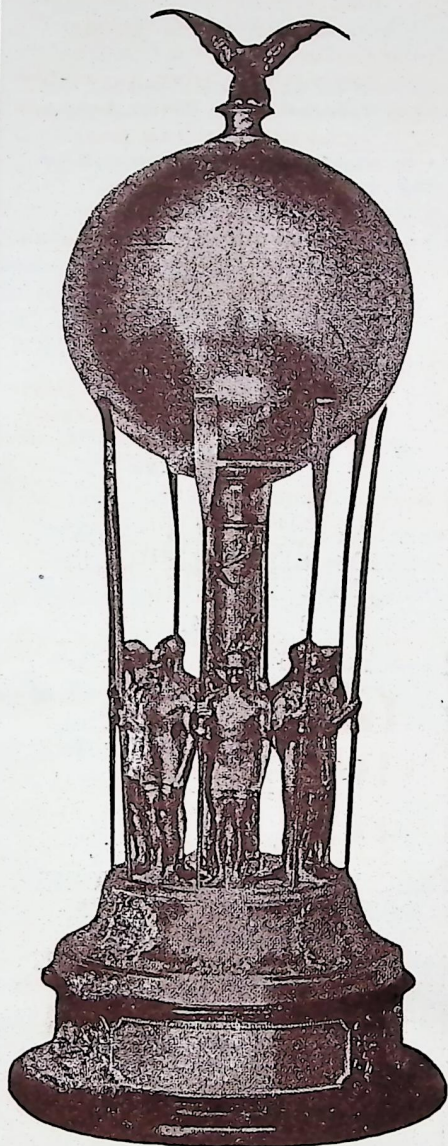

System of Scoring For Julius H. Barnes Point Trophy

All races except trial heats and final of same:

Singles	Winner 10 Points
Doubles	Winner 15 Points
Fours	Winner 20 Points
Eights	Winner 30 Points

Points for others than winners are to be figured on a percentage basis of the above schedule in accordance with the number of contestants as follows:

	2d	3d	4th
Two Contestants.....	20 pct.		
Three Contestants.....	40 pct.	20 pct.	
Four Contestants.....	60 pct.	30 pct.	
Five or More contestants	80 pct.	40 pct.	10 pct.

Trial Heats:—No points to those qualifying for Final; 5 per cent to next contestant in each heat not qualifying for Final.

Winner of Final in any race for which trial heats have previously been rowed to receive points in different classes of races as above.

Others to receive percentage of winner's points as follows:

NOTE—Contestants mean only such as actually start in a race and not those who may be entered and do not start. In the event of a tie or dead heat between any crews the total number of points for the several positions in question shall be equally divided between the crews involved in the dead heat. In the event of a tie between two or more clubs scoring an equal number of points in the Regatta the one scoring the greater number of FIRST PLACES shall be awarded the Barnes Trophy.

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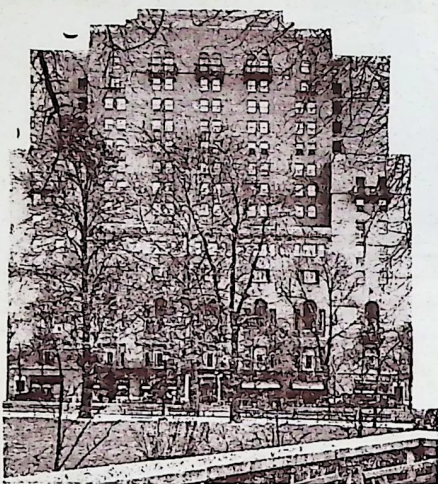

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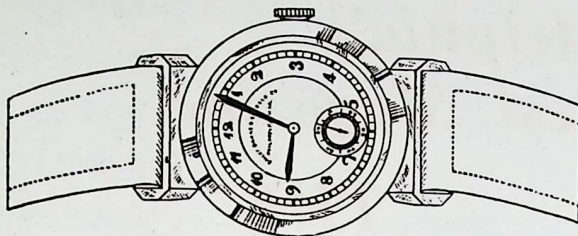
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
