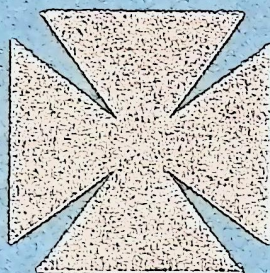

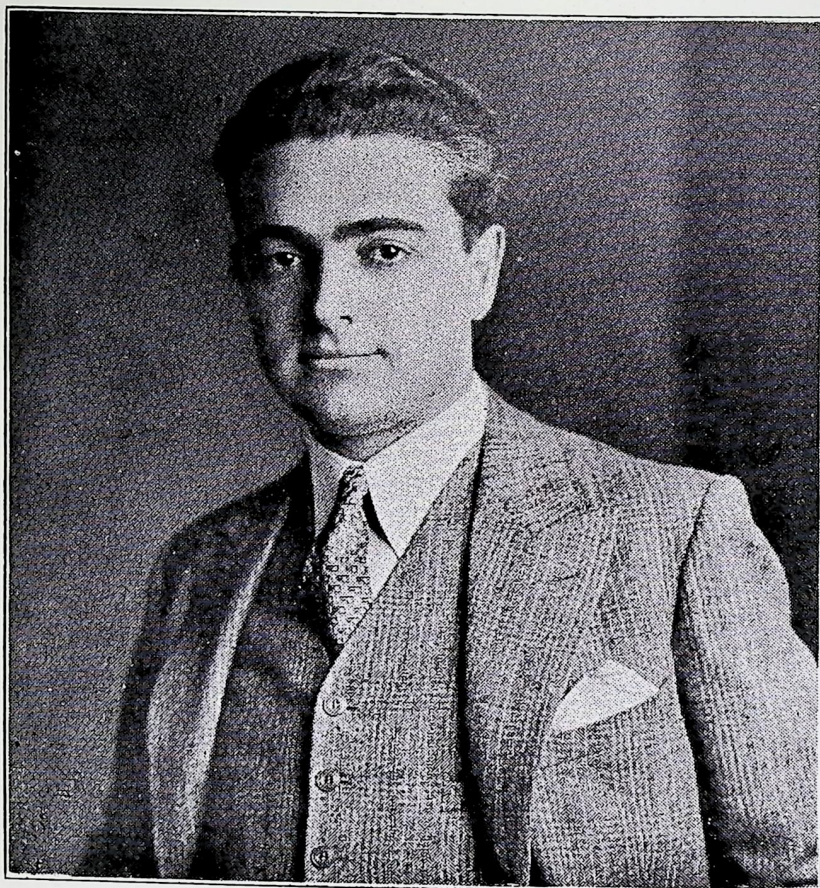

MALTA BOAT CLUB

Since 1860



One of the first recorded descriptions of a boat race, when the boats were propelled by oars, is that written by Virgil in his Eneid, book V.

The race was from a starting line to a rock and back to the starting line. The crews drew lots for place. When the crews arrived on the line, "they gripped their oars; and every panting breast is raised by turns with hope, by turns with fear depressed." The signal for the start was a trumpet blast, and Virgil states "exact in time, with equal strokes, they row." First one boat leads, and then another.

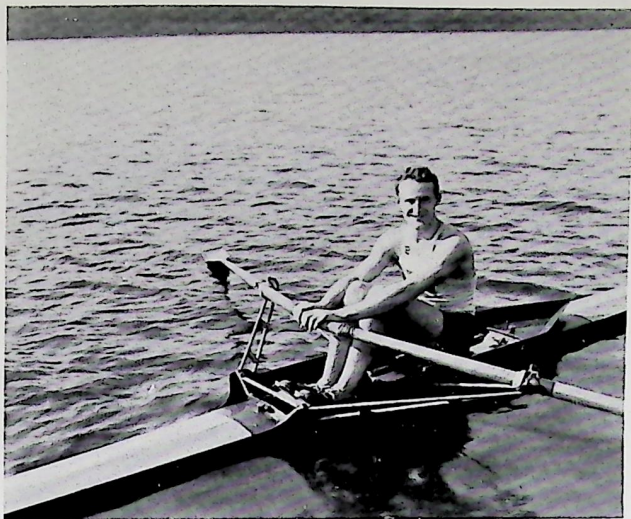
As the boats approach the rock which is the turning point, Gyas, in command of the leading boat, orders the pilot "to stand more close to shore," but the pilot feared the hidden rocks and stayed in deeper water. Gyas saw the next boat coming between him and the rock, thereby gaining the lead. He repeated his order to the pilot, and in his wrath at the failure of the pilot to obey, seized him and threw him overboard, and then took charge of the helm.

Mnestheus pursues and exhorts his crew to "exert your vigor; tug the laboring oar," and he concludes "but to be last, the lags of all the race!—redeem yourselves and me from that disgrace."

Sergestus, anxious to win the race, steers too close to the rock and strikes it, breaking the boat and oars. The crew attempts to push the boat off the rocks.

Mnestheus soon passes Gyas and the race is between he and Cloanthus, Cloanthus' crew, "resolved to hold their own, they mend their pace, all obstinate to die or gain the race." Mnestheus' crew, encouraged, believe "they can conquer who believe they can (possunt, quia posse videntur)."

Cloanthus beseeched the gods of the liquid regions to aid him and offers, if his crew wins, a sacrifice of a snow white bull. His prayer is heard and the gods pushed him on to victory. Generous prizes were awarded to victors, one of the prizes being an Cretian maiden.

ROWING as an amateur sport, with shells similar to those in use today, was introduced by the great universities of England about one hundred years ago and was introduced in this Country by Harvard in 1843 and by Yale in 1844, and their first contests were held in 1852. These contests have continued, practically without interruption, up to the present time.

About this time, rowing attracted the interest of Philadelphia's young men. They obtained equipment and organized themselves into clubs, many of which have been in continuous existence since that time. In order to regulate the sport and develop the interest in it, the clubs formed the Schuylkill Navy in 1858, which is the oldest athletic organization in continuous existence in the United States.

THE BEGINNING

Among the organizations formed during this period was the Malta Barge Club. Later, the name was changed to the Malta Boat Club. The date of its formation was the 22nd of February, 1860. The Club was chartered in accordance with the laws of Pennsylvania on the 25th of April, 1884.

The Club used, in its early days, a house on Smith's Island in the Delaware River, off Chestnut Street. The Island has since been removed by dredging. There the Club kept a barge which it named "Minnehaha." On account of the rough water in the Delaware, the Club in 1863 moved its equipment to "Pop's Boathouse," located on the east side of the Schuylkill River, just above the present Spring Garden Street Dam. In 1865, the Club purchased the clubhouse of the Excelsior Club, which stood on the site of the present clubhouse. On the 22nd of August, 1865, the Malta Boat Club was admitted into the Schuylkill Navy. In 1869, a new clubhouse was built, and in 1901, the house was extensively remodelled, one change being the addition of a third story giving the Club the largest house along Boathouse Row.

THE FOUNDING FATHERS

The Club was formed by seven men who were members of the Minnehaha Lodge of The Sons of Malta. The names of the men are Charles, Julius, Samuel and Harold Illman, William H. Lees, Charles Osborne and Lewis F. Berger. The Club procured a six oared barge and named it "Minnehaha." In 1885 and 1886, the Club was the first supporter of eight oared shell rowing, then an innovation, and adopted the Bob Cook stroke. Cook, who was interested in rowing at Yale, went to England to study the rowing practices there, and on his return introduced to Yale a stroke developed from his observations while in England, which became known as the Bob Cook stroke. The Bob Cook stroke is generally used throughout the United States today.

The Malta Boat Club, in addition to its membership in the Schuylkill Navy, holds membership in the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen and in the Middle States Regatta Association. The Club has participated in all but five of the seventy-five Schuylkill Navy Regattas and has participated in the regattas of other associations. The Malta Boat Club has won the following National Championships:

Senior Quarter Mile Dash, 1924 and 1925, (Algernon E. Fitzpatrick).

Senior Double Shells, 1925, (Bow, Edward F. Haggerty; stroke, Algernon E. Fitzpatrick).

Senior 145 lb. Quadruple Sculls Shells, 1935-1936, (Bow, Robert A. Wilson; 2, Philip H. Cochrane; 3, George F. Rapp; stroke, Frederick H. Symes).

THE ILLMAN FAMILY

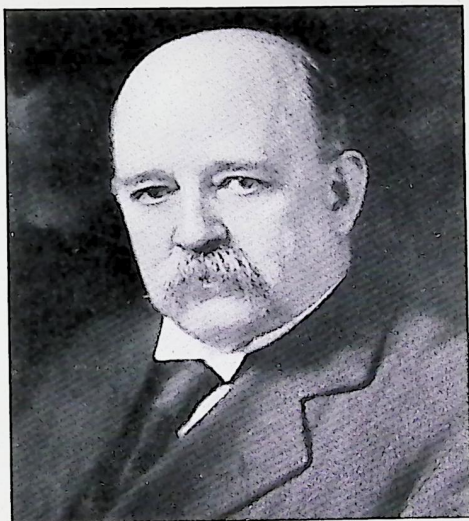
The Illman family, as stated above, was the real founder of the Malta Boat Club. The Illman brothers operated the largest steel plate engraving and printing plant in the United States. During its first years, members of the Club had no definite meeting place, but met at each others homes. Intermittent service in the Union Army retarded the expansion of the Club. Mr. Samuel Illman was Treasurer from 1863 until succeeded by Howard E. Young on January 10, 1893. Mr. Charles Illman was President from 1873 until 1890, and Mr. William H. Lees was President from 1862 until 1868, and Secretary from 1870 until 1891, when he was succeeded by Mr. Howard E. Young. Mr. Edward Illman was one of the popular members of the Malta Boat Club, as well as of the up-river clubhouse known as the Willows. The Willows provided a place and facilities for recreation, athletics and dining until 1932, when it was turned over to the Fairmount Park Commission. At the Willows, various field sports were encouraged, including cross country running. The development of the latter activity established the Schuylkill Navy Cross Country Run, which is held annually on Thanksgiving Day. The Malta Boat Club has won the team prize for the

Run in 1931 and 1932, and the following members have won the race: Robert C. Ayres, 1901; Knute Schested, 1915 and 1916; George F. Rapp, 1929, 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933, and John M. Clarke in 1929, 1931, 1934 and 1935. In 1929 and 1931, Rapp and Clarke finished in a tie.

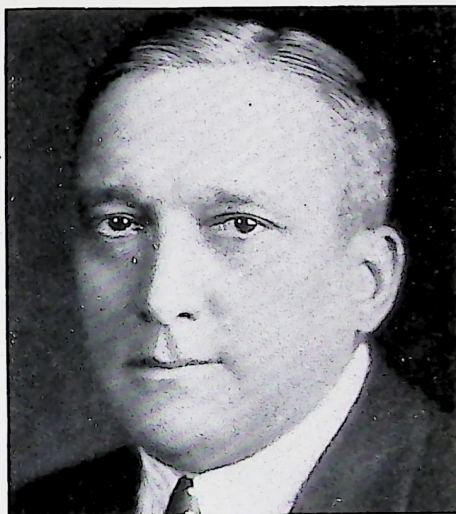
The early members were interested in several branches of sport. In 1886, Charles A. Clark won the featherweight boxing championship of the United States, and George Harkins won the lightweight wrestling championship of the United States at Madison Square Garden. Frank Henderson that year won the Schuylkill Navy championship.

HOWARD E. YOUNG—HENRY PENN BURKE, ETC.

Mr. Howard E. Young loyally supported the Club and was a generous contributor to all of the Club's activities. Mr. Young was proposed for probationary membership in the Club on April 14, 1885, elected to probationary membership on May 12, 1885, elected to active membership on May 11, 1886, elected Assistant Secretary, January 8, 1889, elected Secretary and Assistant Treasurer on January 13, 1891, and elected Treasurer on January 10, 1893, and he continued in the combined offices of Secretary and Treasurer until his death in August, 1933. Mr. Young was also Treasurer of the Schuylkill Navy for many years. The loyal services of Mr. Young may well serve as a model for members of the Malta Boat Club.

The Malta Boat Club has been well represented in the development of rowing in America. The following members have been Commodores of the Schuylkill Navy: Henry Penn Burke, Samuel H. Truitt, Dr. Robert C. White, George G. Melloy and Charles V. Doyle.

Henry Penn Burke has been the Club representative on the Executive Committee of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen for many years. He is now President of the Association and has held this office for many years. He was President of the Malta Boat Club for over twenty years.

Samuel H. Truitt, member of the Executive Committee of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen, was Commodore of the Schuylkill Navy for seven years and has been President of the Middle States Regatta Association and has held many high offices in the Malta Boat Club.



LEWIS H. KENNEY

Lewis H. Kenney has been coach of the Club since 1921, and was President of the Club for three years. Mr. Kenney is a devoted enthusiast of rowing, and is the originator of the Schuylkill Navy Match Races. He also is the principal supporter of rowing for lightweight men, and after many years effort, has been successful in having added to the programs of all regattas, including the National Championship races in the regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen, many lightweight races.

Many of the prominent citizens of Philadelphia have been members of this Club. The present District Attorney, Charles F. Kelley, is a member.

Among the distinguished members of the Club have been the late John Drew, the famous actor, and the late James M. Beck, the well-known lawyer, member of Congress and one-time Solicitor General of the United States.

Wm. J. Cochrane was Chairman of the House Committee from 1926 until 1933, and has had the same position from November last to the present date. He also assisted Lewis H. Kenney in writing the Club's By-Laws, and is the originator of the "Booby-Hatch."

By-Laws of the Malta Boat Club



ARTICLE I

Name and Purpose of the Organization

SECTION 1. The name of this organization shall be the MALTA BOAT CLUB, a corporation duly chartered under the laws of Pennsylvania.

SEC. 2. The object of this organization is to stimulate and support an interest in amateur rowing and other forms of athletics which are supplementary to this sport, and to provide social intercourse among the members.

ARTICLE II

Membership

SECTION 1. The membership of the Club shall be divided into seven classes, namely: honorary, life, sustaining, active, probationary, junior, and associate.

SEC. 2. HONORARY MEMBERSHIP—propositions for honorary membership shall be made by the Membership Committee. The person proposed shall be one who has demonstrated a sustained interest in athletics or who is otherwise worthy of the honor. All names proposed by the Membership Committee shall be presented at a regular meeting of the Club. The Secretary shall inform the membership of the proposed honorary member or members in the notice of the meeting at which election will be held; a two-thirds vote of the members present will be necessary for election.

SEC. 3. LIFE MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those on the rolls of the Club as of March 1, 1934, and to those sustaining members who may apply at any time for life membership.

SEC. 4. SUSTAINING MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those on the rolls of the Club as of March 1, 1934.

SEC. 5. ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those now holding that status and to those probationary and junior members who may hereafter be elected to active membership.

SEC. 6. PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those over twenty-two years of age; the term of this membership shall be limited to one year, at the expiration of which time the probationary member will be proposed by the Secretary for active membership, together with a statement of his financial status on the books of the Club.

SEC. 7. JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those under twenty-two years of age; following their twenty-second birthday, the Secretary will propose the junior member for active membership, together with a statement of his financial status on the books of the Club.

SEC. 8. ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP shall be limited to those who pay a fixed annual sum in lieu of all other dues and assessments.

SEC. 9. Honorary, probationary, junior and associate members shall have no vote, nor hold any office, in the Club. They shall conform to all the By-Laws and Rules of the Club. Associate members are not entitled to the use of the rowing facilities, nor the privilege of representing the Club in athletic contests.

SEC. 10. All the estate, real and personal, belonging to the Club, shall be owned by and vested in the active, life and sustaining members, share and share alike. No member shall be allowed to transfer his share. If an active, life or sustaining member is expelled or resigns, or an active member becomes an honorary or associate member, he shall be held to have thereby forfeited and surrendered to the Club all his right and interest in the property and franchises thereof.

SEC. 11. Propositions for election to probationary, junior or associate membership, and for the reinstatement of any former member, shall be made in writing by an active, life or sustaining member. Propositions for membership other than active shall be submitted at a regular meeting of the Club by the Membership Committee. The name, occupation and address of the candidates shall be posted in the club house by the Committee and incorporated in the notice for the meeting at which the balloting will occur.

SEC. 12. In balloting for probationary, junior or associate members, two (2), and for active members five (5), negative votes shall be equivalent to a rejection of the applicant.

SEC. 13. A resignation shall be tendered in writing and presented at a regular meeting by the Secretary. The Secretary will present a statement of the member's financial status on the books of the Club therewith. A resignation will not be accepted from a member who is indebted to the Club. Resignation shall take effect immediately upon acceptance.

SEC. 14. No person is eligible for membership who has been expelled from any other Club of the Schuylkill Navy.

ARTICLE III

Officers.

SECTION 1. The officers of the Club shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Captain, who shall be elected annually.

SEC. 2. In addition to the officers stated in Section 1, there shall be elected annually: two (2) representatives to the Naval Board of

the Schuylkill Navy, one to be designated Senior Delegate and the other Junior Delegate; five (5) members to constitute a Committee on Membership, one to be designated as Chairman; three (3) members to constitute a House Committee, one to be designated Chairman; and four (4) members to constitute a Racing Committee, with the Captain as Chairman.

SEC. 3. The President shall appoint a Director of the Budget, who shall be Chairman of the Finance Committee; the other members of the Committee shall be the Secretary, Treasurer, Captain, Chairman of the House Committee and Chairman of the Membership Committee.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive all monies collected by the Secretary, Chairman of the House Committee, or other officer of the Club, and deposit them in the bank or banks, as authorized by the Club. He shall pay all orders approved by the duly authorized officers of the Club, and in conformity with the Club budget. The Treasurer shall submit a report at each meeting of receipts and expenditures, and in November an annual report, together with balances on hand; he shall also submit at the February, May and August meetings a quarterly report of receipts and expenditures, in comparison with the budget. He shall furnish a satisfactory bond for \$1500, the premium for same to be paid by the Club.

SEC. 5. The Racing Committee shall have charge of all rowing equipment, its care and maintenance. The procurement of new rowing equipment shall be in accordance with the recommendations of the Racing Committee where approved by the Club. The Committee shall have charge of the training, and of the regulation, of crews and other athletic teams which may represent the Club in competition. No crews or teams shall be entered without the approval of the Club. The Captain shall make, at each meeting of the Club, a report on matters under his cognizance relating to rowing equipment, training of crews and other athletic teams, entries in regattas and other athletic contests, accidents to equipment and other matters of interest to the members. The Captain shall determine the liability of any of the members for injury to any of the rowing equipment in his report to the Club; in general, crews in training are not liable for damages to racing equipment, but others are liable. The Captain shall make an annual report at the ~~November~~ meeting of the operations of his Committee during the preceding year.

SEC. 6. The Membership Committee shall propose all candidates for honorary, probationary, junior and associate membership. The Committee shall investigate the character

of each man proposed for membership prior to the submission of its report. The Committee shall post the names of the applicants on the bulletin board and notify the Secretary in order that the name of the proposed member may be incorporated in the notice of the meeting at which the proposal for membership will be considered. The Committee shall also take that action regarding expulsion indicated in Subdivision (a), Section 2, Article IV, of these By-Laws. The Chairman of the Committee shall submit a report on the activities of the Committee during the preceding year, at the annual meeting in ~~November~~ **SEPT.**

SEC. 7. The House Committee shall have charge of and be responsible for the maintenance, of all Club property other than rowing equipment. The House Committee may employ a steward, who will act under the direction of the Committee. The House Committee will deliver to the Treasurer such funds as it may receive, each month. The Chairman of the Committee will submit a report at each meeting of the Club of all receipts and expenditures and other activities, and will submit a report on the activities of the Committee during the preceding year, at the annual meeting in ~~November~~ **SEPT.**

SEC. 8. The Finance Committee shall submit for approval by the Club, at the annual meeting in ~~November~~, a budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The approval of the budget will authorize expenditures by the officers of the Club named therein and in the sums allocated to them. The Committee shall also arrange for the auditing of the accounts of the Treasurer and officers named in the budget, and submit an auditor's report at the ~~November~~ and ~~May~~ meetings, at which time the Director of the Budget will submit any revisions of the budget which the finances of the Club may indicate to be necessary. **SEPT. APR.**

SEC. 9. Only the officers set forth in the budget are authorized to make expenditures of Club funds, and they only to the amounts allocated to them in the budget.

SEC. 10. Special committees may be appointed from time to time to consider specific problems. Character and scope of the work assigned to a special committee shall be clearly defined.

ARTICLE IV

Expulsion and Suspension

SECTION 1. Any member failing to comply with any of the provisions of the By-Laws, Rules, Regulations or Resolutions of the Club, or for conduct unbecoming a gentleman, may be expelled.

SEC. 2. Expulsion of a member shall be accomplished in accordance with the following procedure:

(a) For cause other than pecuniary indebtedness, the Membership Committee shall submit a resolution at a regular meeting, setting forth the reasons for recommending expulsion. The member concerned shall be provided with a copy of the said resolution, and a notice of the time and place of the meeting at which the resolution is to be acted upon; provided that such notice shall have been presented to the member concerned at least twenty days prior to the meeting.

(b) For pecuniary indebtedness of any classification, the Secretary will submit the name of the member, together with a statement of his financial status on the books of the Club, at the regular meetings in January, April, July and October; the member shall be duly notified of the meeting at which the contemplated action will be taken.

✓ SEC. 3. A two-thirds vote of the active, life and sustaining members present at said regular meeting shall be sufficient to expel such offending member.

SEC. 4. A member in arrears for the previous quarter's dues shall be liable to suspension. The Secretary will report at the meetings in November, February, May and August, the names of any member or members who are in arrears for such previous quarter's dues.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers and Standing Committees

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club, appoint special committees, and perform all other duties usually assigned to this office.

SEC. 2. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence, and such other duties as may be assigned to him.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall have charge of the correspondence of the Club, issue all meeting notices, record the minutes of all meetings, and perform the usual duties pertaining to his office. In addition, he shall present quarterly statements of dues to the members, in November, February, May and August, receive dues, and deliver all dues so collected to the Treasurer. He shall also present the names of the junior and probationary members who are eligible for election to active membership, at the meetings in November, February, May and August, together with a statement of the financial status of each one on the books of the Club. The Secretary shall be bonded in the sum of \$500. The Secretary shall be exempt from dues during his term of office.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings

SECTION 1. The regular meetings of the Club shall be held monthly, on the second

Tuesday evening of each month, except when such date shall occur on a legal holiday, in which case the meeting shall be held on the third Tuesday of the month; ~~except that there will be no meeting in the month of September.~~ The annual meeting of the Club shall be held in ~~November~~ ^{SEPT.} ~~November 1st and end October 31st.~~ ^{AUG.}

SEC. 2. Special meetings may be convened by the President at his discretion, or at the written request of five members the object of which shall be set forth in the notice of the meeting issued by the Secretary. At such meetings, no other business than that set forth in the meeting notice shall be transacted.

SEC. 3. At all meetings, five active, ~~life or sustaining members~~ shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 4. The Secretary shall issue notice of the regular and special meetings of the Club, informing the members the time and the place where the meeting is to be held. The notice shall be issued at least three days before regular meetings, and twenty-four hours before special meetings.

SEC. 5. The order of business for regular meetings shall be:

1. Reading of the minutes.
2. Secretary's reports. CORRESPONDENCE
3. Treasurer's report.
4. Budget Director report.
5. Captain's report.
6. House Committee report.
7. Membership Committee report.
8. Report of other committees.
9. Propositions and elections for membership. SEN. DELEGATE
10. Unfinished business.
11. New Business.
12. Nomination of officers and committeemen.
13. Election of officers and committeemen.
14. Adjournment.

SEC. 6. Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the conduct of all meetings.

ARTICLE VII

Nominations and Elections

SECTION 1. Nominations of officers and members of standing committees shall be made at the regular meeting in ~~October~~ ^{AUG.} and posted in the club house twenty days previous to the election. No one shall be eligible for election whose nomination was not made at the ~~October~~ ^{Octo-AUG.} member meeting, except in the event of withdrawal of some nominee, in which case additional nominations for that office shall be made at the annual meeting in ~~November~~ ^{SEPT.}

SEC. 2. Elections shall take place at the annual meeting in ~~November~~ ^{SEPT.}

SEC. 3. All elections shall be by ballots cast by those present at the meeting.

BY-LAWS

SEC. 4. A member shall not be eligible to vote, nor to be a candidate for any office or standing committee, if he is indebted to the Club in any amount immediately prior to the time balloting for candidates takes place at the annual meeting.

SEC. 5. Vacancies occurring for any reason in any office or standing committee shall be filled by nominations presented at a regular meeting and by an election held at the following regular meeting. The name of the candidate or candidates shall be posted in the club house as set forth in Section 1, and eligibility for office shall be determined as set forth in Section 4, of this Article.

ARTICLE VIII

Entrance Fees and Dues

SECTION 1. Dues shall be payable quarterly in advance on the first of November, February, May and August, except in the case of junior members, who shall pay six months' dues in advance with their applications for membership, and quarterly thereafter, and excepting associate members, who shall pay a year's dues in advance with application, and a year's dues in advance thereafter.

SEC. 3. Dues may be waived in extenuating circumstances, providing the name of the member and the situation is presented by the Secretary at a regular meeting of the Club; a 2/3 vote of the members present shall be necessary for decision.

SEC. 4. The entrance fee paid heretofore by probationary and junior members upon election into the Club, shall be credited, if equivalent, to the active membership entrance fee.

SEC. 5. Dues of active, probationary and junior members, if residing 50 miles or more from City Hall, Philadelphia, Pa., shall be one-half those stated in Section 2.

ARTICLE IX

Assessments

SECTION 1. An assessment may be levied in accordance with the following procedure: the reasons for the assessment and the amount of the assessment shall be presented by a resolution at any regular meeting of the Club by the Finance Committee; a draft of the

resolution will be incorporated by the Secretary in the notice of the next regular meeting, informing the members that action will be taken on the resolution at that meeting.

ARTICLE X

Reinstatement

SECTION 1. A former member who resigned from the Club may be reinstated on application to the Secretary. The application will be forwarded to the Membership Committee for report and recommendation at the next regular meeting of the Club, at which time action on the application shall be taken, due notice of this application having been brought to the attention of the members by the Secretary.

SEC. 2. A former member who was expelled for pecuniary indebtedness may be reinstated on payment of all indebtedness to the Club, application for reinstatement to be made to the Secretary, who will refer the application to the Membership Committee for report and recommendation; due notice of the application being issued to the membership by the Secretary in the notice of the meeting at which action on the application will be taken. Failure of the applicant to pay all arrearages within a month after notification of reinstatement, shall render his election null and void.

SEC. 3. A 2/3 vote of the members present shall be necessary for reinstatement. ✓

ARTICLE XI

Flag and Uniforms

SECTION 1. The flag shall be of suitable proportions and consist of a white field, the field surrounded by a navy blue border, with navy blue Maltese Cross in its center.

SEC. 2. The rowing uniform shall consist of a white jersey with a six-inch square blue Maltese Cross on the breast, navy blue trunks, and white socks.

SEC. 3. Uniforms for other athletic activities will include a white jersey with six-inch square blue Maltese Cross on the breast; the trunks to be blue and of suitable characteristics for the sport; the other details to be of suitable characteristics for the sport.

ARTICLE XII

Amendments

SECTION 1. Amendments to these By-Laws shall be presented at a regular meeting in the form of a resolution, setting forth the reason for the amendment or amendments. Notice of the resolution shall be incorporated by the Secretary in the meeting notice for the following regular meeting, informing the members that action on the amendment will be taken at that meeting. A 2/3 vote of the members present at the meeting shall be necessary for the adoption of the amendment. ✓

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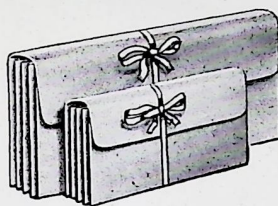
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
